Nine Rockville Sister City Corporation (RSCC) members will travel to China in September, and their trip will include a visit to Jiaxing, Rockville's Friendship City. We want to show that we are interested in learning more about the Chinese culture and see if a formal sister city relationship is possible.

The annual RSCC membership meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 24th, in Rockville's Glenview Mansion. At 6:30 PM we will serve light refreshments. The formal meeting will begin at 7:30 PM in the conservatory. Members will vote for four RSCC Directors. Please try to attend.

On a more somber note, it is with great sorrow in my heart that I reflect on the passing of three very dear RSCC friends. Two former Board members, who also served as president, recently passed away. James Patrician died February 2013, and David L'Heureux died June 2013. The latest loss is our dear friend in Pinneberg, Renate Beplat, who passed away in July.

There is, however, also much great news to report. It has been a very busy time for Rockville, hosting the Pinneberg Tanszchule Leseberg dance group in June and July. They performed at the Rockville 4th of July celebration and at the Twinbrook Baptist Church, where the Chinese Dragon Dancers and The Finest! performed a routine together. Carol Nicholas and I represented the city of Rockville at the 57th Annual Sister Cities International Conference in San Antonio, Texas. We attended workshops to learn more about how to improve our sister city program. The theme this year was "The Power of Exchange: Creating Sustainable Cities and Sustainable Relationships."

An exchange with students from the *Gemeinschaftsschule* in Pinneberg to Wootton High School is planned for September. More information will be forthcoming.

In addition, Rockville will welcome the newly elected (November 2012) Pinneberg *Bürgermeisterin* (Mayor) Urte Steinberg the first week in October when RSCC will be commemorating

All visitors will be hosted by RSCC members. *Bürgermeisterin* Steinberg will be officially welcomed by the Rockville Mayor and City Council during one of their meetings, and the city will display Pinneberg *Fotokreis* pictures in the Senior Center. The North Bethesda Photography Club is working closely with RSCC on the event.



While our Pinneberg visitors will be in Rockville, RSCC has planned a dinner at the Golden Bull in Gaithersburg on Saturday, October 5th. Our featured speaker for the dinner will be the principal of the German School, Mr. Waldemar Gries. German-American Day Dinner

Traditionally the Rockville Sister City Corporation hosts a dinner to commemorate the anniversary of the settling of Germantown, Pennsylvania in 1683. This community was the first German settlement in what would become the United States of America. This year's commemoration will be held on Saturday, October 5th, 2013, at 7:00 PM at the Golden Bull Grand Café. The Golden Bull is located at 7 Dalamar Street in Gaithersburg, Maryland.

This year we will be able to welcome the new mayor of our sister city Pinneberg on her first trip to Rockville. The thirteen-member *Fotokreis* delegation, who will be here to display a selection of their photographs, and students from Pinneberg participating in an exchange with Wootton High School will also attend. For this reason, it was decided to select a restaurant specializing in local fare. The Golden Bull is well known for its good food and friendly atmosphere. The guest speaker will be Mr. Waldemar Gries, Principal of the German School Washington, DC.

There is a choice of three pre-selected entrées for the plated dinner. The complete dinners offered are roast prime rib of beef, Chicken Marsala, and fresh filet of salmon. Only pre-paid reservations will be accepted. Pinneberg after World War II (Cont'd.)

My article in the March 2013 issue led to fascinating feedback, particularly from Bernd Hinrichs of the DAGRP and our own George Albrecht. I had said that my readings about the war in Europe left me with many questions about what it must have been like in Pinneberg as the war ended, with so many displaced persons (DPs) adding to the post-war problems and shortages. In particular, Bernd was tremendously helpful in contacting his friend Johannes Seifert of the *Geschichtswerkstatt*, or History Workshop, who forwarded to me a

lengthy article he wrote as well as a war diary and other information from the British military occupation of Pinneberg. Bernd also mailed me a book, *Pinneberg 1945*, and George Albrecht lent me his copy of *Pinneberg—historische Streiflichter (Pinneberg—Historical Highlights)*, both of which were published by the *Geschichtswerkstatt*.

The firebombing and near total destruction of Hamburg by British and American bombers in July and August of 1943 caused only peripheral damage to Pinneberg but resulted in a huge influx of homeless refugees from Hamburg. As the war ended, many more DPs added to the problems. The articles and books go deeply into the postwar British military government's objectives and the often losing battles it fought concerning preparations for municipal elections amid all the shortages. Seemingly insurmountable problems resulted from coping with critical lack of solid fuels, gasoline, power, water, and food, as well as the very poor nutrition and hygiene and the tremendous housing shortages. In spite of all this, there was a slow return to cultural life with concerts and theatrical performances.

Everyone suffered, from the Pinneberg residents to prisoners of war and foreign workers. Looting was rampant. In May 1945, according to "*Die britische Militärregierung in Pinneberg 1945 – 1951*," or "The British Military Government in Pinneberg 1945 – 1951" by Johannes Seifert, there were "problems getting enough food and gas for the new residents of Pinneberg. Refugees lacked shelter, blankets, beds, heating, ovens and stoves, cooking pots, plates and cups."

Pinneberg and Elmshorn became sanctuaries as conflicts grew between permanent residents and refugees. Good translators were in short supply, especially when the DPs did not speak German. Large barracks were built in Pinneberg to

accommodate troops and refugees from the east. There was a large increase in venereal disease as the ban on fraternization between occupation troops and the German population ended. By August 1945, with the influx of German refugees and forced deportees from other locations, Pinneberg's population had more than doubled. In 1946 British military authorities requisitioned Pinneberger flats and houses to meet the needs of their troops; we can only imagine how this aggravated the hardships everyone was enduring.



The Cap Polonio became a focal point for assigning quarters and food collection. In early 1947 the "Baltic University" was moved from Hamburg to Pinneberg; it had been set up to educate Baltic refugees and emigrants. It closed in September 1949, and when resettlement schemes were introduced, many of the "Balts" wanted to stay, causing additional problems. There was a great deal of friction between the Baltic University and the DPs in the Eggerstedt Barracks. Through it all, however, some cultural life endured in the barracks. In one

instance, a group of Latvian opera singers gave a concert. By 1950 many DPs had been sheltered for over five years, and by 1957 at least some DPs from nearly ten countries still remained.

Near the end of George's book, a chapter titled "*Freundschaft über den Atlantik*," or "Friendship over the Atlantic," goes into the establishment in 1957 of the Sister City relationship between Pinneberg and Rockville. There is even a ceremonial picture of Rockville Mayor John Freeland during a 1982 visit to Pinneberg. Now these old memories of the wartime years and their aftermath are part of history, but we have much better shared memories made with our wonderful friends from Pinneberg.

Former RSCC Member Visits Rockville


